Fighting fraud and outsmarting scammers

Money safety

Fraudsters and scammers will do anything to get their hands on what's yours.
Catch scammers in the act by spotting the signs and learning how to keep yourself safe.

Watch out for these types of social media scam:

These things can look real but can be fake.

Fake tickets

Only buy tickets from a **legitimate ticketing website**, not random sellers online.



Counterfeit goods

Scammers **copy clothes and trainers**, pretending to sell the real thing at an amazing price, but the **item doesn't actually exist**.



Fake job ads

Watch out for **fake job ads**. If a job sounds sketchy, **promises high pay**, and asks you to send money to get started, **don't do it**.



Money muling

A **money mule** is someone who lets a criminal use their bank account to move money on their behalf. This is often disguised as a legitimate job advert — so if a "job" asks you to move money through your account, **don't do it**.





Global Money Week 2026 takes place from March 16 to March 22, focusing on the theme "Smart Money Talks" to promote financial literacy among young people worldwide.
